





Your Programme Homepage




Once you have logged onto the programme you have registered for, you will land on your programme homepage.





Inside the programme modules




Your first access to the modules is through the home page. As mentioned previously, access to the modules will be provided gradually along the programme.






Within a module, you can navigate through the upper pane as well as return to the course home page.






It is advisable that you first watch the module overview available on the upper right hand pane.





In the central pane you find the module overview and the module objectives.






The left pane continues to be the same as the programme homepage. You can engage in forum discussions, access the programme calendar, view other participants on the programme, and see your profile.





Though this will be the standard pane through your programme, for more extensive programmes, there might appear an additional module menu that subdivides larger modules into topics.












The quiz is a set of 10 questions that a participant is expected to answer – one at a time.
